A is for American Hornbeam.



The American Hornbeam has lots

B is for Butternut

p is for Pin Oak



The leaves on the Pin Oak change every year.

The seed from this tree can feed the deer.

Q is for Quaking Aspen

The bark of this tree is white.

a cage.

S is for Slippery Elm

It can grow up to 70 feet tall and can weigh a ton.

the ground.


V is for Virginia Pine
